



Preface

The following Christmas songs are presented here in simple arrangements providing an option of accompanimental possibilities and a flexibility of instrumental combinations.

The instruments generally suggested are Handbells and Recorder, but where these are unavailable, substitutions might be satisfactorily employed: i. e., any melody instrument (Violin, Flute, Clarinet, Oboe) of similar range and volume might be used in place of the Recorder; where the Handbells play a single-line melody, chimes, lyre, tone bars, or melody bells could be used; where the Handbells are involved in a more harmonic accompaniment, tone bars or even the piano might be substituted. In numbers suggesting a simple chordal background, guitar, autoharp, organ, or piano could be used.

Ultimately the overall balance of the available resources ought to provide the main basis for deciding which instrumental combinations to employ.

All of the accompanying possibilities suggested for each individual number need not be used for every stanza of that work. In fact, a variety of the possible combinations might add interest.




